

General Livestock Guidelines

ENTRY ARRIVAL AND RELEASE

- All Inside Agricultural and Family Living Exhibits are to arrive at the Fairgrounds on Thursday, August 15, 2024, between **4:00pm – 8:00pm** *except Beer and Wine Exhibits, which are to arrive by August 1 at 7:00 pm.*
- All Inside Agricultural and Home Economic Exhibits will be released on Sunday, August 25th, 9:00 am –11:00 am.
- Antique Farm Machinery may arrive between Monday August 12 thru Friday August 16.
- **Breeding animals may arrive on Saturday if accompanied by market animals except for hogs. In which case, the Superintendents must be notified in advance.**
- **Following are the Livestock Arrival and Release Dates::**

*Horse arrival and release times may vary depending on stalling availability.

- **No animals will be released from their stalls until midnight, no exceptions.**
- The owner of any animal coming from another fair should notify the entry secretary prior to the fair. The animals will be accepted until 4pm on Saturday, August 17, 2024.

GOOD HOUSEKEEPING AWARDS

(No pre-entry is required)

1. All animal exhibitors who maintain the most attractive and sanitary exhibits will be eligible for special daily rosettes.
2. Unannounced inspections will be made. **First Sunday of the fair through the last Friday of the fair.**
3. To be considered for such award, the exhibitor's name must be clearly identified
4. All animal exhibits will be scored on the following basis:

	Points
Cleanliness of animals	15

Cleanliness of bedding	15
Entry card and ribbons won properly displayed with animal	20
Keeping grain and hay feed presentable	10
Keeping all equipment sanitary and neat	10
Keeping aisles clean	15
Courtesy to people	15
Total	100

Awards will be awarded daily to each species group. The judge may determine that there are not three exhibitors, within a species, meeting the criteria and a lesser number of awards may be given. Results of winning exhibitors will be posted daily at the Fair Office. Please obtain your award from the fair office.

2024 Westmoreland Fair

Animal Exhibition Health Rules and Regulations:

Veterinary-client-patient relationship (VCPR) and Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) requirements.

- Veterinary-client-patient relationship (VCPR) forms are required for all breeding and market animals housed at the Westmoreland Fairgrounds, including swine, cattle, sheep, goats, horses, llamas/alpacas, rabbits, and poultry. These forms must be filled out completely and signed by a licensed veterinarian. **The following rules apply for all IN-STATE animals:**
 - For horses, cattle, sheep, goats, and llamas/alpacas a visual, in-person inspection by the signing veterinarian is required within **90 days** of check-in to the Westmoreland fair for completion of the VCPR form.
 - All swine must have a completed VCPR form as well as a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) that is completed within **30 days** of check-in to the Westmoreland fair.
 - Poultry and rabbits are exempt from visual, in-person inspection but the VCPR forms must still be signed by a licensed veterinarian.
 - CVIs are **NOT REQUIRED** for all in-state horse, cattle, sheep, goats, llamas/alpacas, poultry, and rabbits. CVIs may be used to accompany these animals if desired but they must be dated and completed within 30 days of check-in to the fair.
 - **One VCPR form should be filled out per exhibitor listing all their individual show animals.**
 - Any and all **out-of-state animals** are subject for further regulations and requirements – these requirements can be found through the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture’s 2024 “Animal Health Requirements and Recommendations for Animal Exhibition, Including Commercial Exhibition” document.

GENERAL ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

- **All animals admitted to (show or fair) shall be identified by a unique and permanent ear tag or leg band, tattoo, brand, RFID tag or records of unique physical markings.**

- **Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious, or external parasite disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes.**
- **All animals admitted to (show or fair) must comply with applicable state (7 PA Code) or federal (9CFR) rules.**
- **Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and will be rejected if there is evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease, or if health certification, Veterinary:Client:Patient:Relationship (VCPR) form or identification documentation is not acceptable.**
- **All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after return to the herd of origin.**
- **USE CAUTION WHEN FITTING YOUR ANIMALS** Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use not banned on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. **Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals. DO NOT USE IT!**
- ****IMPORTANT! ** IF UPON SLAUGHTER, TREATMENT WITH DRUGS, BIOLOGICS, OR ANY CHEMICAL FROM FITTING PRODUCTS, IS THE CAUSE OF CONDEMNATION OF A CARCASS, THE LOSS OF THE CARCASS AND ANY OTHER DAMAGES WILL BE BORNE BY THE EXHIBITOR. IT IS STRONGLY RECOMMENDED THAT ANIMALS MUST BE WASHED BEFORE SALE.**
- **ALL CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION OR VCPR FORM WILL BE COLLECTED AT THE TIME OF CHECK-IN TO THE FAIRGROUNDS AND WILL REMAIN ON FILE.**

DAIRY & LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR RULES

1. 4-H and FFA exhibitors showing in both open class and junior classes must pay an entry fee for each division and submit separate entry blanks.
2. Livestock and dairy 4-H/FFA exhibitors must have a completed up-to-date project book for the animal to be shown. Junior show superintendents must have these books checked before any animals are judged.
3. **Animals in breed classes must have registration papers in the exhibitor's name or a lease agreement, as required in each species section. All breeding projects must be owned and identified by June 1 of the current project year. Market livestock must all attend and be identified at designated countywide identification day!**
4. If there is a valid reason that the exhibitor cannot show his/her animal(s) then another member who meets the requirements may show that animal(s); however, this member will not qualify for showmanship contest. Exhibitors not showing their own animals must notify the show superintendent before entering the ring.
5. Exhibitors may show an overweight or underweight animal in showmanship classes only, if they do not have an animal of that species, including breeding project that is eligible. One overweight or underweight animal per exhibitor will remain on the fairgrounds but will not be sold through the Westmoreland Jr. Livestock Sale. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to remove the animal from the fairgrounds at the closing of the fair.
6. During the Westmoreland Fair project animal grooming of any kind is limited to Westmoreland County 4-H or FFA members with assistance of current Westmoreland County 4-H leaders or FFA advisors, and immediate family. Any exhibitors witnessed violating this policy by a Superintendent, Jr. Livestock Committee member or a Fair board member will be removed from competition in that species following a discussion with violator and said representative.
7. **No artificial hair or material** is to be used to enhance an animal's appearance. No aerosol cans or pressurized containers will be in the makeup area.
8. Unethical or abusive activities are not allowed and will result in the disqualification of the exhibitor from the show and forfeiture of premiums.
9. Junior exhibitors are not permitted to have their animals in barns other than their designated stall area.
10. **Classes with exhibitor's age classifications are ages as of January 1 of the current year.**
11. **Exhibitors should dress appropriately for the species they are exhibiting. Clean, neat apparel in all cases. Dairy exhibitors are required to wear all white for the showmanship contest.**
12. Exhibitors, when provided, must wear designated exhibitor identification i.e., Hat, back number, etc.

13. **The number of lots that 4-H and FFA exhibitors are permitted to sell through the Westmoreland Jr. Livestock Sale is limited. Please reference the Jr. Livestock Handbook for further details.**
14. **Important:** Animals consigned for slaughter during or immediately following the show shall not receive any treatment with drugs or biologics within the withdrawal time prior to slaughter. Withdrawal times for drugs and biologics are all stated on the directions for use. Label directions must be followed at all times. If upon slaughter a recent treatment with drugs or biologics is the cause of condemnation of a carcass the loss of the carcass will be borne by the exhibitor. **The Fair Management reserves the right to test any animals for the illegal use of drugs or antibiotics.**
15. Junior market livestock exhibitors are responsible for their animals until **NOON on Sunday close of the fair.**
16. All animals must be housed in barns only.
17. Over fitting of **ALL LIVESTOCK** is discouraged. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
18. **NOTICE: Do not enter animals that you have no intention of bringing (ex. For tack space) this will lead to loss of premiums.**
19. **All 4-H and FFA members must show their own animals in showmanship.** No substitutes.
20. All livestock exhibitors are responsible for their own bedding.
21. **All market poultry will only remain on the fairgrounds for 72 hours and be slaughtered at the conclusion of the fair by a designated USDA processor.**

HOME BRED AND COUNTY BRED CLASSES

HOME BRED: The goal of the Homebred class is to recognize 4-H and FFA members who are breeding, raising, and showing their own market livestock. This recognition program is a way of extending acknowledgement to members that put time and effort into a project throughout the entire year by maintaining a breeding animal and then carrying the offspring as a market project.

To be a homebred animal, the mother of the offspring must be owned by the member or immediate family at the time of the breeding and the birth and rearing of the animal, which resulted in the project. A member must also be carrying a breeding project in that species in order to show a homebred project. All homebred animals will automatically be County Bred.

The homebred project animal does not have to be offspring of the animal used as the youth's breeding project. Carrying a breeding project means that the youth has identified a breeding project and is carrying a record/project book on that animal. **IT DOES NOT MEAN THAT ANIMAL HAS TO SHOW AT THE FAIR!** But the record book on that animal will have to be up to date and present at check-in.

Homebred animals have to be designated at the time of weigh-in or tagging. Any animal not designated at this time will not be acknowledged as a homebred animal. The highest placing homebred animal in each weight class will be brought back into the ring after the selection of champions to compete for Champion and Reserve Homebred.

Animals will receive a rosette and will be designated in the program and sale catalog.

COUNTY BRED: The goal of the County Bred class is to encourage and acknowledge 4-H and FFA members to purchase animals which have been bred within Westmoreland County. This will encourage close working relationships between livestock producers in the county and the youth members and organizations.

To be a County Bred animal, the project animal must be bred by a Westmoreland County producer or a family that participates in the youth programs of Westmoreland County. Animals must be bred and born within Westmoreland County. Animals purchased at sales within the county but not produced by a livestock producer from within the county are not eligible.

County Bred animals have to be designated at the time of weigh-ins or tagging, late designations will not be accepted! The following market animals, Steers, Lambs, Hogs, and Goats will use these classifications. For more information on these opportunities please contact the Extension Office. The breeder's name and address must be given at the time of designation. Any animal not designated at this time will not be acknowledged as a County Bred animal. The highest placing County

Bred animal in each weight class will be brought back into the ring after the selection of Homebred Champions to compete for Champion and Reserve County Bred.

Animals will receive a rosette and be designated in the program and sale catalog.

PREMIER JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

Open to Champion and Reserve Champion 4-H /FFA Showman of each of the following livestock species:

Breeding Beef and Market Beef

Breeding Sheep and Market Sheep

Breeding Hogs and Market Hogs

Market Goats, Breeding Meat Goats and Dairy Goats

Dairy Cattle

Llamas/Alpacas

Horse Sr. Western Showmanship and Horse Sr. English Showmanship

Representatives from the Fur and Feathers Competition

- Specie judges will score each individual. Premier Showmanship selection is based on total scores.
- Contestants will be scored on knowledge of the species, showmanship ability, and proper attire and equipment. **Participants must have their show animals available. Appropriate awards will be presented.**

Fur and Feather Finale

4-H and FFA Rabbit and Poultry Champion and Reserve Champion Showman are invited to participate in the Fur and Feather Finale Wednesday 10 am at the Poultry and Rabbit building. Each Showman will be scored on their showman skills with both Rabbit and Poultry Species. The Fur and Feather Committee will select the animals to be used in the competition. The Exhibitor will draw lots to determine the animal that they will work with. Each Showman must announce their intent to participate by Tuesday noon.

The combined score from each species and their placing in the original showmanship class will determine the winner. The winner will have the opportunity to participate in the Premier Livestock Showman Contest.
